River Bourgeois is a well-kept secret.

That's an observation we have made and so have family and friends who visit us and also marvel at the beauty that surrounds us.

When we arrived here in 1976 to search for a property to buy we had not heard of River Bourgeois. We were not strangers to Cape Breton Island because during the 1960's when we lived in southwest Newfoundland we often traveled to Cape Breton yet somehow we had missed seeing this extraordinary part of the island.

We all have so much to enjoy here. The sight and sound of the ocean is never far away. The landscape teems with birds and animals and an infinite variety of flowers and plants. Wherever we look there is the pleasing vista of shores and coves and tidy homes and well-tended gardens. As if all this isn't riches enough we have also made the acquaintance of many kind, neighbourly, self-reliant people who live nearby. Of all the places we have lived this community is the most caring.

The house we bought was constructed in the 1880's and is, I would guess, one of the oldest houses in the community. It is a fine example of a style of house, which was constructed throughout rural Nova Scotia about a century ago. It was home to three generations of the Morrison family and it was our good luck that when Herman and Margaret Morrison decided to sell it we were on hand to buy it.

Most days we spend several hours working at our writing – although on pleasant summer afternoons we prefer to spend as much time as possible outdoors. We never lack for things to do in this idyllic place, at any season.

#### Mowat Environmental Institute

In 1990, the Mowat Environmental Institute was established at Brick Point, River Bourgeois, by federal charter.

Funded jointly by Claire and Farley Mowat the M.E.I. is devoted to the study and protection of the

plants and animals of Cape Breton in general and of the River Bourgeois region in particular. It does not attempt to prevent the use of wildlife resources by human residents but to conserve them so they will not be depleted or destroyed.

The M.E.I. consists of approximately 180 acres of land at Brick Point. The Research Station provides a base of operation and living quarters for researchers studying the plant and animal life of the region. Within its boundaries it is a sanctuary for all forms of life as well as a study area.

Farley and Claire and some research scientists have kept detailed records of plant and animal populations, and the changes in these, over the 23 year period, and the information has been entered in a data base from which it is possible to see the state of each population and whether it is increasing, declining or holding its own.

In a world where human activities increasingly threaten the health of the environment the M.E.I. tries to serve the function of the "canary in the mine" and give warning when the natural habitat is in trouble or under threat.

Visitors are welcome to experience the research property on foot but are asked to please not disturb its plants or animals or to disrupt any studies taking place on it. Farley Mowat

At the head of the River, top of Thibeauville, up on the the Highway, we have a nice snug looking house, in which one of our smart old Mr. Ned Thibeau, lives with his daughter Minnie-Minnie is alright until her father who is nearly 97 yrs. old or Robbie Thibeau who isn't much younger get out with the sychte, and if you see anyone out in the field up there with a pair of scissors, that's Minnie, trying to save her flowers by cutting the grass around them before they are cut down by her father or Robbie. Robbie lives next in the little house, which he moved into when he came down from Thibeauville. Keeping on down the highway, we have a nice new bungalow belonging to Bernie Burke, who still lives in Halifax. Right next to this is another new bungalow belonging to Mr. and Mrs Henri Leblanc, and by the way, Mr. and Mrs LeBlanc have moved into their new house since our last issue. A little further on William Robertson has a canteen and a small cottage, while Amos Thibeau has a small cottage built next to his bungalow. Francis Boudreau, who had Mrs. Isiah Pottie's house hauled from Hawker, some years ago, had it remodelled and lives near Amos. On the opposite side of the

highway, a little further down is another nice looking cottage, belonging to Amable Beranger, son of Mr and Mrs Wm.Beranger.Past Joe's brook, on the highway, is Davy Richard's cottage. and not too much further is a modern new mill owned and operated by Fred Digout..."-(Sorry ,Marie wasn't finished but I ran out of room-SD)
