So many card games we had there, I was Theresa Burke then. Lorraine Landry, Ernest and John would be there as well as Philomen and Minnie Laneville. Evelyn tells me that she remembers Julia Cordeau and her sister Genevieve LeBlanc crossing on the ice some fine nights to be in the game. Leo came back from sailing in 1945 and was part of the games as was Gervase Landry who on leave from the army etc.

We had many laughs at the house in those years; everyone called Evelyn their Aunt Ebby. She had so much patience to put up with our noisy gang. We all have good memories of the games. *Theresa Landry*

1871 Census

The 1871 census of River Bourgeois lists the family of Walter Bisett as Family #58 residing in Dwelling #57. Walter, age 40, resides with his unnamed wife. At the time they had two sons,

Alfred, age 8, and William, age 3 as well as a daughter, Mary, age 7.

A second Bisit family resided in Dwelling #165 as Family #172. This was the family of George Bisit, age 44, and his unnamed wife of 39 years. They had the following children: M. Martina, age 16, Henry, age 13, James, age 11, George, age 10, Alfred, age 8, William, age 7, Charles, age 5, William and Claurence, age 3, and Ernest listed under 1 year of age.

The third family resided in the same dwelling as the above George as Family #171 and was listed as Mr. & Mrs. George Bisit.
