

Delore is the son of the late Amable and Tillie Burke of the Church Point. As war broke out in Europe, young Delore joined the Navy and set sail overseas on the HMCS Moose Jaw leaving his young bride Hilda Burke at home. Upon arriving in the North Atlantic off the coast of Iceland, the Moose Jaw became the first to sink a German warship. Thirty-seven prisoners of war were taken aboard the Canadian ship. Delore recalls the absolute terror on the faces of these prisoners, most of whom were only in their late teens, as they boarded their vessel. In August 1944, Delore returned home to his love Hilda and to manage the post office and open his country store. Stamps were three cents each, a far cry from the thirty cents in 1980 when he retired after 46 years as the postmaster. Delore and Hilda's store was in the same building as the post office and located directly below the school so as a result the majority of his customers were the children speeding down the hill at recess and lunch time to get their penny's worth of jaw breakers. In 1964 the store and post office were moved to the basement of the house and in 1980 Delore sold the store business to Maurice Landry. Delore and Hilda's favorite pastime was dancing and they spent countless Saturday nights at the legion doing so. Hilda passed away in 1994 after more than fifty-two years together. They had one son Irvin who lives in Dartmouth and a pride and joy granddaughter, Claudine who resides in Ontario. Delore has been a legion member since 1944 and still loves to dance. He is a member of the church choir and a church reader. These days he loves to strum his guitar and sing while cousin CJ Richards accompanies him on the piano. *Sharon Chilvers*

Five children resulted as a consequence of this union, Danny in River Bourgeois, Vincent, Ann and Leonard in Halifax and Rose in North Carolina. Excerpts from The River Round Up–Jan 18th, 1957:

"Once again at Christmas time we had the usual splendid Christmas Concert, which was held at the Auditorium of the new school and which was given by the pupils. One of the most enjoyable parts was the music supplied by the "Pottie Orchestra". Included in this were Milton Pottie who played both violin and guitar selections, accompanied by his sister Audrey on the Piano. These are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Lorenzo Pottie. With them was their cousin Richard Pottie, son of Mr. and the late Mrs. Willard Pottie who also played both violin and guitar selections. Then the usual Santa Claus party was held at the Parish Hall when over 300 children of the Parish which included all of the children of the parish of school age and under received a gift from Santa. This party, which was introduced by Rev. Fr. Samson after he arrived here, has become one of the highlights of the Xmas season, there; one may see almost all the children of the Parish and many of their
