

Frances (Bourque) Digout attended Teacher's College in 1930 and upon graduation, began her lifelong career as a teacher. Her first three years of teaching were at the three-room school at the east end of the river. There she taught 45 children in grades five, six and seven. In 1934 she moved to Port Felix to a one-room school teaching 68 children (yes, sixty eight children-this is not a typing mistake) from grades primary to nine. School hours commenced at 8:30 am and often did not end until 6 or 7 pm, after assisting the older children with their homework and teaching them crafts. In 1937 Frances returned to River Bourgeois to teach one year in Cannes and to marry the man of her dreams, Leo Digout. Together they had three daughters, Estelle who resides with her mother, Elaine in Calgary and Yvonne who passed away in 1969. The family now includes eleven grandchildren, sixteen great grandchildren and one great great grandchild. Sadly Leo passed away suddenly in 1989 after fifty-two years together. In 1945 Frances returned to teaching at the east end, however, because there were fewer students it was now a two-room school and she shared the duties with James Richard. Heat was only provided in the school after October 15th so when it became cold prior to that date, the students trudged into the woods where they cut and carried the brush back to the school. In 1954 when the new school opened in River Bourgeois, Frances became the icon of the grade two-class room and I personally can attest to that. Frances was notorious for her daily spelling bee contest until her retirement in 1977. Frances now spends her days' scenic painting and has many displayed in her home. She has donated many of these beautiful paintings to raise funds in the community. The many children you have taught thank you, Frances, and wish you the best. *Sharon Chilvers*

Beverly and Al had our travel all planned out. Several days were spent in Florence with its beautiful churches, the original statue of Michelangelo's "David" and the Ponte Vecchio Bridge. Other day trips included Assisi and the Church of St. Francis, Venice where we rode on the waterbuses, but not gondolas, as it was too chilly. We saw the Rialto Bridge and the Academia (museum) that houses the artwork done for St. Ursula. This was of special interest to my daughter of same name. We also went to Rome and visited Vatican City, which is quite impressive. St Peter's Square is huge as is St. Peter's Basilica. We went especially to be there for the Papal Blessing. The Pope ("Papa" in Italian) went by us quite close in his open car and it was very special to see him in his setting. We passed through the Vatican gardens and saw the Swiss guards (to be a Swiss guard a young man must be Swiss and catholic). The Sistine Chapel was beautiful with all its paintings and frescos and it is overwhelming when you think of all the time and effort put into it. We have about 70 subscriptions plus sell approx. 110 locally. Since June 18<sup>th</sup> when we went online we have had 980+ hits.
