Bob Pettigrew- A Great Ambassador



Bob was born in Economy, the second of six children in 1924. At eighteen years of age Bob left home to join the army. His first assignment was to load pigs on a ship headed for overseas to feed our fighting soldiers. The dockworkers in Halifax were on strike for better wages (they were making \$10.00 an hour) while Bob received \$1.30 a "day" as a replacement crew. Following basic training in Yarmouth and advanced training in Aldershot, Bob soon left for Europe landing in Scotland and then on to England. As the regiment prepared for D-Day several members of the crew came down with the mumps and spinal meningitis so all were quarantined and they missed the most famous battle of the war and perhaps saved their lives.

After recuperation, the crew moved on to France where Bob joined the North Nova Scotia Highlanders regiment. Upon their arrival in Caen, France they discovered the only building standing was the church. Since Germany had retreated from central France the next assignment was to begin invading the seaports along the coast occupied by Germany. It was off the coast of Dover where Bob was hit in the back and leg by enemy gunfire. Bob was transferred back to

Canada to recuperate but unfortunately his leg had to be amputated at Camp Hill Hospital.

Bob spent the next six years with many ups and downs in his life as he operated the elevator at Camp Hill. He alleges to have taken Queen Elizabeth II for a ride on the elevator however the most important person he met on his lifts was an enchanting young lady named Mary Fougere of River Bourgeois. Mary worked in food services at the hospital and on September 18th, Bob & Mary will celebrate fifty years of wedded bliss. In 1954 Bob & Mary decided to make River Bourgeois their home.

Bob has been a member of the Legion for 57 years and has served two terms as president as well as many other positions on the executive committee. He was awarded the highest award in the legion the " Palm Leaf" and also the Meritorious Award for his many years of volunteer service. Bob was the President of Community Services of RB and still serves on the Board of Directors. Bob was also the first President of the senior's 50+ Club in RB and now serves as 1st Vice President. He was the First President of the Rich Co. Senior's Council that deals with concerns and the rights of the elderly and still presides on that board. Bob also is on the Strait Richmond Hospital Advisory Committee. He is a member of War Amps of Canada and has served as President of the NS Branch. In 1996 Bob was given the "Remarkable Senior's Award" from the Senior's Expo in Halifax. Oh yes! Bob was also Santa for many years. With all those achievements on his resume Bob likes to relax each weekday morning playing a game of cribbage with his friend, Max Mombourquette, over a beer in the tavern. ### The Davidson Musicians

Estwood Davidson was born in Chipman, New Brunswick. In 1913, as a young man he headed for

Halifax to seek employment. He found work in a garage and that led to his profession as a mechanic. Estwood always had a keen interest in music and began to take guitar lessons from a local professor, however work and music would soon take a back seat. When World War II broke out in Europe, Estwood joined the Navy and was quickly shipped overseas and served on several destroyers during the next six years.

Prior to the war years Estwood had an acquaintance by the name of Winston "Scotty" Fitzgerald. Now Winston was in the process of carving a name for himself as a great violinist and invited Estwood to join him in creating a musical group along with Beatty Wallace on the piano. Thus the "Entertainers" were born. Over the next 26 years they would record several LP's, have their own radio show on CJCB, make television appearances, tour from Newfoundland to British Columbia and throughout the USA. They also became a popular fixture on the square dance circuit.

In 1956 Estwood took the beautiful Rachel MacPhee from River Bourgeois as his bride and they eventually made RB their home. Estwood opened "Davidson's Garage" and ran it for the next twentytwo years, retiring in 1981. Rachel and Estwood have three children, Debbie, Verna and Harold and all inherited their father's love of music. They began singing and playing music at a very early age, performing at various concerts and local events. Debbie took piano lessons from many music instructors and was soon tagging alongside dad and playing along with the band. Later, brother Harold would join the band as a bass guitarist. In the seventies, Debbie and Verna along with their childhood friend Darlene (Sampson) Beaulieu began singing for local weddings and many times Debbie would play the church organ. Harold's 1st venture away from the family was with the Port Hawkesbury youth band followed by a group called "Breaking Tradition" with whom he produced three CD's. Harold travelled with this band all over Canada and the US and performed with famed folk artist John Prine. On July 14th Estwood celebrated his 89th birthday and he hopes music will always be part of the Davidson family and that the next generation of Derek, Robbie, Jordie and Myles will continue the family tradition. *Sharon Chilvers*

Stuart O'Connell. Our condolences to her son Donald and his children.


## History
