I would like to thank everyone that helped and donated to the River Bourgeois 25th Annual Festival. Your assistance and donations towards this celebration truly make it a success. Without you, we as a committee could not have pulled it off; it takes time, money, and a whole lot of help from everyone to accomplish ten days such as this.
