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Father Zbigniew Siemionow

In a small town of Nidzica, Poland on April 5th, 1971 a young couple Wanda & Kazimierz Seimionow welcomed their first-born child named Zbigniew. Little did these parents know that someday their son would find his way to River Bourgeois and become such an integral part of our lives.

When Zbigniew was five months old, the Siemionow family moved to an industrial town of 4000 people called Tarnow, where there was more employment. The family welcomed a daughter , Malgorzata, the following year. At age three, Zbigniew experienced life's first tragedy when his father was killed in an accident. Both sets of grandparents lived in the same town and became an even more important part of Zbigniew's life.

The government of Poland, being communist following World War 11 had little tolerance for the Catholic Religion. The citizens of Poland had always been predominately Catholic and their strong faith made them even more determined to maintain their religious beliefs. By the time Zbigniew was a teenager the government had all but given up in their

attempts to stop the practice of Catholicism. More than 95 percent of Catholics attended church regularly however with the fall of Communist Party in the late eighties the percentage of churchgoers fell to 65 percent, as there was no longer a challenge to defy the government.

In 1989, at the young age of eighteen ,Zbigniew made a conscientious decision to join the priesthood. Following six years of study at a Seminary he was ordained in 1996 and was now known as "Father Zbigniew". Father shared the parish of Saint Martin (12,000 people) with four other priests. On a regular Sunday he said three Masses per day and heard confessions during the other Masses. Five to six hours per day during the week was spent teaching religion at the schools and during Easter week the sacrament of Reconciliation started at 6:30 am and ended at 7 pm.

In 2001, Bishop Colin Campbell came to Poland in search of three priests to serve in the Antigonish Diocese and soon afterwards Father Zbigniew was River Bourgeois bound.

Father spent the first five months at UCCB in Sydney studying English while residing at St. Anthony Daniel Parish in Sydney. The next four months were spent learning the liturgy in English under the direction of Sister Agnes Cordeau of Holy Angels Parish. In June of 2002, Father arrived here in RB to a change of pace from his large parish in Poland but he has gradually become accustomed to a new way of life. Father likes RB but admits to missing his family and friends. Father had an opport unity to see Pope Paul 11 in Toronto when he went with the youth of our community last July.

When asked if he would remain in Canada he replied "I came here to serve under the direction of my bishop and can be called back at any time". We are very selfish here in River Bourgeois so we hope that it will be a long time before that phone call arrives *Sharon Chilvers*.

Operation Maple Syrup

For the last few weeks, maple syrup producers across the region have been up to their buckets in sap. Adrian Touesnard's Maple Stand up in Oban is winding down now and what started out as a grim looking season has turned out not so bad. When to tap the Maple tree (Rock Maple is best) is one of the biggest decisions he has to make. If you tap (put a Spigot in the trunk after drilling a hole) before the sap is ready to flow from the roots, you might have to tap again. If you wait too long, you might miss the run as sap flow is highly weather dependent. Temperatures must be below freezing at night and rise to + 5 degrees for a few days to trigger the sap flow. The sap is allowed to drip into an aluminium bucket ,collected , pooled and toted back to Adrian's workshop which becomes a sugar shack for a couple of weeks; and boiled for hours in an evaporator to get rid of all the water until you reach the syrup stage which is determined with different instruments.

It takes from 40-60 gallons of sap to make a gallon of maple syrup. The process including making the road accessible ,the sterilization of equipment, tapping, collecting, evaporating ,filtering ,bottling etc. plus all the fretting as to whether the sap will run is worth it when you get to taste the syrup. No! It doesn't hurt the trees and folklore has it that the sap stops running when the frogs start to sing. If it's a good year, you may see a sign on Tina and Adrian's lawn saying "Maple Syrup For Sale.
