# Gerard Touesnard

In 1896, a young sixteen year old by the name of Emile Touesnard from France was serving in the French Navy when the ship docked off the shores of Cape Breton. Emile tied his clothing to his head, jumped ship and swam to shore eventually ending up in River Bourgeois. He would later marry Mary Sampson and have ten children thus starting a family tree that now numbers almost three hundred. This story is not about Emile but about the wondrous life of his roving seventh son, a cute blue-eyed blond who was born on September 29<sup>th</sup>, 1920 and named Gerard Michael.

Gerard left for Halifax after his schooling to work. However, a short time later war broke out and in 1940 he joined the Merchant Marines. Gerard sailed on the Foundation Franklin, an ocean tug vessel that sailed along the Canadian shorelines rescuing the broken down ships and returning them to Halifax or St. John's for repair. On Jan. 11th, 1945 he scurried home to RB to marry his longtime sweetheart the beautiful Cecile Sampson. A year later son Adrian arrived followed by three daughters Vivian, Mary-Agnes and Darlene. All three girls married Sampson's (their mother and grandmother's maiden name) and they all reside in Louisdale while Adrian lives in pop's front yard. The family now includes ten grandchildren and seven (soon to be eight) great grandchildren.

In 1945, Gerard began a string of careers. He went to work at Val Kyte's service station in St. Peter's and in 1947 left to build his own service station/grocery store in RB now known as Bucky's. Minor car repairs were done here along with tire/gas sales and also keeping the east end supplied with food. In 1955, Gerard and Cecile sold the business to Walter Fougere and Gerard went to dabble in car sales for the next two years. In 1957, Gerard now headed out to the lake boats in Ontario where he remained until 1959 and upon his return, moved to St. Peters where he started a beef farming business. When the business became too large and more land was needed Gerard packed up his family once again and moved to Seaview, where now the farm included dairy products. The Willie Nelson song "On the road again" was based on Gerard's life.

In 1974 with the intention of moving back to RB they sold the business to an American. However, Cecile really wanted to stay in the same area so they changed their minds and bought a large parcel of land in Oban. There was only one problem, there wasn't a house on the property so they purchased Amable Burke's house on the North side and hauled it with trucks and tractors (very slowly) up to Oban without so much as breaking a window. Here they farmed both beef and sheep and in his spare time Gerard also experimented in real estate. Meanwhile, Cecile set up a food stand next to her son's yard in RB and sold fruit from down the valley and local farmers. Daughter Vivian and her husband would later use this land to build Howard's Groceries. Every spring Gerard would take his wife on a week's long vacation to PEI where they would have their wool spun into knitting varn and blankets. In 1988 due to Cecile's failing health they once again moved to RB and for the next twelve years Gerard nursed and catered to her. Sadly, Cecile passed away in July 2000 after fifty-five years together.

These days Gerard squanders his days wearing out a path to his son's door. He spends his spring days with Adrian in the production of Maple Syrup. He also helps Adrian in the making of outdoor furniture from alders. The girls drop by weekly to make sure he is well fed and to take care of the cleaning. Gerard does not plan on any new moves except for the one straight above (that's what he believes). Gerard, you are a very special person, you have touched the hearts of many and the people of River Bourgeois wish you nothing but the best.

# History

#### The first settlers at River Bourgeois?

It is believed that the first settlers at River Bourgeois were established there sometime around 1770-75 at a place called Les Étangs.

Les Étangs ont été pendant très longtemps la patrie des Richards. Le premier, cependent, à s $\neq$ établir aurait été un nommé Léli Cordeau à qui le gouvernment avait concédé une terre vers 1770. Des terres furent concédées aussi à Urbain Cordeau, Richard McPhee, Patrice Pâté, Galetan (ou Gaéton) Richard, Mais pendant longtemps il n $\neq$ avait que des Richard à cet endroit (Ephrem Boudreau, <u>Rivière-</u> <u>Bourgeois</u>, Les Éditions Lescarbot, Yarmouth, 1984, pp 24-25).

This story is repeated in Garvie Samson  $\equiv$  book on River Bourgeois (Garvie Samson, <u>The River That</u> <u>Isn  $\equiv$ </u> Published by Author, Dartmouth, 1994, p. 16). The evidence, however, does not support this version of the story since the main protagonists in the story arrived at River Bourgeois much later. The story of Lily Cordeau is recounted in his petitions for land in 1812 and 1817.

Petition to Nepean, 1812: Petitioner, a native of Disgoose, age 37, with a wife and seven children, lost all his belongings in the storm of the preceding September. He was invited by his brother-in-law, Mathew Balang, to share a farm on the Island of Barrachois De Cutteau near the Burgeois River. Petitioner built a house on the lot and lives there with his family. Note: Balang has sold the lot to Thomas Thomas for 5 and has removed to Tracadie, N.S. Petitioner asks that his claims be protected. Petition to Ainslie, 1817: Petitioner renews his petition, and states that the lot is a peninsula, not an island as first stated. Report of Crawley to Crowdy: 80 acres, one half the peninsula on the north side of the Lenox Passage called l' Ile des Coteaux. Plan (Cape Breton land petitions and other material 1787-1864, Nova Scotia Archives and Records Management).

Lily  $\equiv$  brother Eurbain (Urban) received a grant of land at the same time. A map showing the location of the grant confirms that this is in fact at the Étangs. A quick calculation of the ages of Lily and Urban suggests that they were born sometime around 1775 and 1780 respectively which is consistent with their ages as reported on the 1813 Militia List as 38 and 35. It must be concluded that the Cordeau brothers were not the first settlers at River Bourgeois. We need only look at the 1811 Census to confirm that they were still living at D $\equiv$ scousse, consistent with their story as reported above. *Paul Touesnard* 

So who were the first settlers? The conclusion will be printed in September issue.
