Familiar Faces



Fabian, Francois and Lionel Pottie

Fabian, Francois and Lionel are the three youngest sons of Cornelius and Irene (Beaver) Pottie of Cannes. The others were William who passed away in 1989, Wilfred who passed away in 1992. Their sister, Rita LeBlanc, resides in RB and brothers, Joseph and Walter both died in infancy.

Fabian Patrick was born October 14th, 1930 and as a young man went to work with his father who was the chief cook on the boat *Foundation*. After taking ill with epileptic seizures, Fabian returned home to RB. Fabian lives in his great grandfather, Charlie Fougere's original home, which was converted to a wood shed for many years and then altered again to become his homestead.

Francois Xavier was born October 8th, 1934 and unlike his brothers chose to remain in RB. In 1959, Francois's life almost ended during a snowstorm when he was hit by a car driven by Father John Jewel. The accident shattered his legs, several ribs and he had severe head injuries. After he received some thirty-five units of blood, a metal plate in his head, his legs put together by nuts and bolts, he was placed in a body cast for several months. The doctors told his parents he would never walk again but after a couple of years in a wheelchair followed by the use of canes, Francois proved them all wrong. Several

years later he lost a kidney and has had three operations on his knees, which are now artificial. Recently, he returned to Halifax to have his esophagus stretched for a second time.

Lionel Richard was born August 3rd, 1939 and at the tender age of seventeen also went to work with his father on the *Foundation* for four years. After two years working with the Dept. of Highways, Lionel worked as a waiter on a Dept. of Fisheries boat sailing to the United States, PEI and Newfoundland for the next four years. Lionel returned home to take care of the household and his parents. Their dad passed away in 1973 and their mom in 1992.

In 2000, Lionel and Francois moved to the seniors building but Fabian chose to remain in his home. They love their new home and enjoy helping the neighbours. They can be seen daily walking up the road to visit their brother Fabian and sister Rita. All three brothers attend every function at our community centre. They all love music and François can sing almost any song he has heard on the radio. Their love of music is second only to their strong religious faith. Their friend and neighbour, Guy Heudes, takes them to church regularly and also to run their errands. In August, Gerarda & Eddie Pettipas held a party for Lionel in honour of his sixtyfifth birthday and Francois is looking forward to his seventieth birthday party this month also at Gerarda & Eddie's. Francois and Lionel pass the time away by helping Peter LeBlanc in the garden and carrying in his wood. "Emily is such a great cook," they claim and they also add "Peter is not a bad cook either".

Fabian, Francois and Lionel may you always continue to be part of our community and all of us in River Bourgeois wish you many more years of health and happiness. *Sharon Chilvers*

Early Vessel Owners at RB

In 1811, only 20 years after first being settled, River Bourgeois already had several vessel owners¹. Of the 19 heads of family listed in the 1811 Census, 6 were vessel owners. Vessel ownership had begun much earlier, however, when in 1796 John Samson along with his brothers Lewis (Louis) and Marshall (Martin) registered the 20 ton shallop *Margarite*. This vessel it appears was named after John's wife. Two years later in 1798 Andrew, Cyprian and Martial DuGats (Dugas) registered the 26 ton shallop *La Trompeuse*. The same year Belony, Peter and Thomas Landry registered *L'Effrontée* a 31 ton pink

stern shallop. As the records in the early years of the Sydney Shipping Registry are not complete, little is known about what became of these vessels. In 1801 Martial Dugats registered the 34 ton shallop *Nancy*. In the same year Lewis (Louis) Boucher registered his first vessel Shark a 33 ton shallop. This vessel was sold and removed to Shelburne sometime later but it is not known when it passed out of the hands of Louis Boucher. The first schooner owned at River Bourgeois, a 57 ton square stern schooner named Mary, was registered by John and Lewis Sampson in 1804. In the same year Simon Fougere Sr. registered his first vessel, a 47 ton square stern schooner named Susan. At this point 5 of the 6 founding families (Landry, Sampson, Dugas, Fougere and Boucher) all owned vessels. The first to replace a vessel was Louis Boucher who registered the Morning Star a 31 ton pink stern and schooner rigged shallop in 1805. He later sold this vessel in 1809 at Halifax and replaced it the next year with a larger vessel. This vessel, also named Morning Star, was a 62 ton square stern schooner which he later sold to an owner in Newfoundland in 1815. In the same year, 1810, the Fougeres (Simon Sr. and Jr.) registered a second vessel the 65 ton square stern schooner Daylight which they later sold to owners in Europe in 1816. It is possible, although not recorded on the Census of 1811, that the Fougeres, Simon Sr. and Jr. each owned a vessel for a time since Simon Jr. was listed as the master of the Daylight. In 1814 the first vessel was registered by Burkes, Joseph and Peter, that being the Nancy, a 26 ton pink stern shallop. The year 1814 was a busy one with four additional small shallops registered. The 21 ton Morning Star, by Anselm Landrie; the 26 ton *Three Sisters* by Andrew Dugat: the 28 ton Gertrude by Belony Landrie Sr. and Jr.; and the 22 ton Daylight by Lewis and Honore Boucher (his son).

Although information on the Sydney Shipping Register is sparse for this period one could conclude that ownership of vessels at River Bourgeois was persistent over the first 25 years of its settlement. Most of the founding families acquired vessels soon after arrival and continued to own vessels over time replacing them as needed or when opportunities for sale presented themselves. It was a sign of things to come.

- ¹ A shallop was a small open decked vessel used mainly for fishing or short voyages usually within sight of land.
