Annie Mae Burke

Annie Mae was born November 11th, 1914 the eighth of nine children to Abram & Harriett (Boudreau) Landry in River Bourgeois. Annie Mae attended the east end school until the age of thirteen when she left to go work as a housekeeper for Cameron & Lil Boyd of the Southside. She left the Boyd's to take care of Amable Boucher in Grand Gully as his wife had to rush to Boston to tend to a sick sister. Soon afterwards, Annie Mae went to take care of her cousin, Simon Landry's (who had been recently widowed) seven young children.

In 1937, Annie Mae became smitten with a handsome gentleman named Mabie Burke. Mabie was a widower with two young sons; Joseph, now living in San Jose, California and Carman who passed away in 2000. He was sixteen years older but that didn't deter Annie Mae in her pursuit of happiness. In 1940, Annie Mae went to work in Halifax as a housekeeper and on Thursday, November 27th, 1941 Annie Mae and Mabie were married at Saint Thomas Aquinas Church in Halifax. Immediately following the wedding they motored to

River Bourgeois for a three day honeymoon. On the following Monday, Mabie left Annie Mae with her mom and returned to work in Halifax. After several months in Halifax, Mabie quit and went to work in Sydney so he could come home weekends. They moved in with his parents Phyllis & Cyprian for the next two years while they were remodelling the home they purchased from Amable Bona.

Mabie and Annie Mae would later add six more children to their family. Hattie in Little Anse, Gerald who takes care of mom, Betty who passed away in 1995, Mary Agnes in Little Dover, Phyllis in Halifax and Peter in Whiteside. Mabie sadly passed away on November 28th, 1988 one day after their forty-seventh anniversary. The family now includes thirteen grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Peter, Annie Mae's youngest son related this story to me about his mom. "Mom always enjoys a good game of cards (poker) and on this occasion the stakes were small (nickel and dime). Because mom has arthritis in both her hands she finds it difficult to pick up change off of the table so to compensate she just slides her winnings into the lap of her dress. On this one occasion mom had a very good poker hand and was concentrating so intently that she did not notice that her granddaughter has spilled a glass of milk on the table and it was running off the table and onto her dress that contained all of her winnings. All of the other family members that were playing could not believe that she had not noticed and we were in stitches laughing. The moral of the story is that when mom is playing cards she blocks out all that surrounding her".

Last month, Annie Mae celebrated her ninetieth birthday with her family and friends. These days she plays cards (no milk allowed at the table), watches television and never misses Mass. She also tends to her sons, Gerald and Peter's, garden. Annie Mae (my one and only great aunt) we all wish you the very best and may you celebrate many more birthdays.

From the July 31st opening ceremony in Claire to the Grand finale concert at the Garrison grounds in Halifax on August 15th, Acadians throughout Nova Scotia celebrated 400 years of cultural survival and growth. The Sam(p)son Reunion in Petit de Grat and Arichat, provided both son John & I the opportunity of meeting cousins dating from our origins 400 years ago in St. Gatien-des Bois, Normandy, France.

Beginning August 13th the communities of Petit de Grat and Arichat provided three days of events which included suppers, music, concerts, memorabilia, and genealogy information booths. We made new friends and met old ones such as Dr. Herman Samson, wife Madeline and son Charles. Some will recall Herman playing baseball with the Red Caps of Petit de Grat. In later years he exchanged the baseball bat for surgical instruments becoming a heart specialist in Louisiana.

The highlights of our visit included a genealogical presentation in Arichat by Herman's son, Charles, an architect practicing in LA. He became intrigued with his ancestral roots and published a comprehensive booklet entitled 'Our Samson Ancestors', *The history and genealogy of the Acadian Samson family*. Later, during supper at Petit de Grat, I made a chance encounter with an old friend Tony Gudgin of Niagara Falls, ON, who compiled a CD entitled 'Richmond County Genealogy'. His wife Olive's great grandparents were Venant Venong Sampson & Adelaide Elizabeth Landry from RB.

The Acadian reunions throughout the province were extremely successful, leaving everyone feeling a great sense of pride with their heritage and the utmost respect for their ancestors who endured such hardships to survive.

History

Excerpt from the River Round Up Dec. 17th, 1958:

"What might have ended in tragedy, was avoided on Tuesday evening when Roderick Burke, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe P. Burke of South River Bourgeois, pulled Maynard Boyd, son of Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Boyd, from the waters of a pond near what is known as the

Brickery. Maynard, with a group of others had gone skating and on his way to shore he went through the ice. Roderick, who was ahead of him, skated to shore and threw a large stick which he found to Maynard. By holding on to the stick Maynard, whose hands were becoming numb, held on until a towing rope was pushed out to him. The rope was then attached to Roderick's truck, which was near the shore, and Maynard was hauled out. There are several places frozen over, but skating, especially at night at this time of the year, is very dangerous".

History does repeat itself as last month while Maynard was getting his boat hauled up for the winter at the St. Peters canal his "aging" knee failed and he plummeted overboard into the cold waters once again.
