

The River Round Up

On November 15th, 1920 life in False Bay changed forever when a pint size little girl named Elizabeth Jane (Lizzy Jane) was born to Sam and Christina (Pottie) McPhee. At age five, she would walk from Hawker to the west end school to be taught by Sarah Digout. The first winter following a bad snow storm her father Sam came with a sled to take her home, however, Jane fell off without her dad noticing until he made it all the way home. Sam returned to find little Jane sitting in a snow bank covered in snow. After four years of school she now knew how to read and write (Jane has made great use of these subjects as at eighty three years of age she is still an avid writer and reads every newspaper in print including the Round Up). She figured that if she could read a cookbook it was all the education she needed so she stayed home and cooked her heart out.

A family friend by the name of Sammie á Charlie (Pâté) would visit and each time he would give Jane a nickel in hopes she would go on a date with him. After giving her a total of seventy-five cents and still no date, Sammie went on to date someone else but Jane had enough money to buy herself some yard goods and a pattern for a dress. It was to be the first of many dresses that Jane would make. At fifteen Jane left home with the two dollars her father gave her and went to work for the MacInnis family in St.

George's Channel. For eight dollars a month she did the housekeeping and tended to the farm animals. After six plus years, Jane moved to Sydney where she worked as a housekeeper for the next three years making twenty-five dollars a month. It was during one of her many visits home that she went to a barn dance in Barra Head and met a very handsome *younger* man by the name of Gervase Landry.

Gervase Alfred was born on February 9th, 1921 the son of Joseph and Alvina Landry of the South Side. The third of nine children, Gervase's family suffered hard times especially following the sudden death of his dad when he was only nine years old. In 1942, along with brother Cletus, he joined the army and they were shipped overseas. Gervase was shot twice in the arm in one day during combat in Holland and was sent to recuperate in Belgium for three months before being shipped home. As a result of the shrapnel still in his arm, his army days were over.

Following his meeting with Jane at the barn dance, a courtship ensued and on September 10th, 1946 they wed. The newlyweds moved in with Gervase's mom Alvina, brother Cletus and his new wife Margaret, sister Ethel, her husband George Bowser and their two children and Gervase's younger sisters, Theresa and Melda. Since Jane had read all those cook books, she became head chef. Eventually all of the others would move on except for Gervase and Jane who would stay for the next thirteen years until Alvina received her first old age pension cheque. One month prior to leaving for Hawker, their daughter Lola was born and for three months while Gervase was building their new home, he, Jane and baby Lola lived in what is now their shed. Two years later their son Melvin was born. They now have a wonderful son-in-law Kenny and two adorable grandsons, Kevin and Nathan.

Gervase retired from years of working construction in 1976 and enjoys life to the fullest. He loves to play cards and never misses a bingo. In 2002 he was awarded a Dutch Medal for his service

in Holland. He is a lifetime member of the Legion and has received a Meritorious Award and an Appreciation Certificate. Both Jane and Gervase are founding members of the RB Seniors 50+ Club. She was a stay at home mom who loved to knit, sew and make quilts. At the Legion bingo, Jane is better known as "Ma Petite Penguine". Jane claims she was so poor growing up that when her first pension cheque arrived she kissed it and has kissed everyone she received since. She was a charter member of the CWL and loves to play her accordion and now that Gervase can't hear very well she can play much louder and longer.

Lola and Melvin have not inherited their mother's musical talents however Jane is very proud that her grandson Nathan has. Jane sings continuously especially when she cooks and she still makes the best bonnach in RB and won first place in a biscuit-making contest in Lakeside several years ago. She is the first every month to read "The River Round Up" and has helped boost our circulation. Aunt Jane and Uncle Gervase are unaware that I am writing their story so I hope all the tales she has told me over the years I have recalled accurately. We all wish you both many more years of health and may you always yell "Bingo". Thanks to Lola Pettipas and Ann Clow for their help. *Sharon Chilvers*

On April 20th, the spring "Peepers" were heard for the first time in 2004 and it also coincided with the end of the running of the sap. Last year we told you about Adrian Touesnard's Maple Syrup Operation. Unfortunately this will be its last year. As a one man operation it has proven to be just too much work, also unfortunate is that for its last year the yield is down 75% due to weather conditions. Adrian has enjoyed the past years though and will miss watching the process unfold from start to finish.

By the time you receive this, spring will be well underway, but today is the 24th of April and we had some snow overnight. Lots of signs of it though-the River is clear of ice, Robins, Great Blue Herons and other migratory birds have been slowly returning. The Osprey are here and the Coltsfoot is blooming.

Each year this means that our Migratory Bird Count is coming up. On May the 8th birds will be counted all over North America. We are looking for people to check out their feeders or go for a walk and report in. Last year in Richmond County we had 26 individuals taking part and they counted 73 species. This year we would like to beat that record. Call George (County Coordinator) at 535-3516 if you can donate some time. Remember we count every bird we see on that day so you don't have to be an expert.

Birding is the fastest growing recreational pastime and our area is doing its share. Bernard Burke (Mary & Ernest's son) from the Southside is getting to be an expert both at identification of rarities and the photography of birds.
