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The Gift of Life



Wanda and Lola

Wanda (McNeil) Burke of River Tillard received the gift of life with a new kidney on February 24th. The kidney was donated by her sister-in-law Lola (Burke) Stevens of Lantz.

Wanda's story: My grandfather died at the age of thirty-two with what was then known as a bleeding kidney. He had eight children, of which four were diagnosed with kidney problems including my mother. My mother had ten children and at age forty-five went on a kidney dialysis machine after being diagnosed with PKD (Polycystic Kidney Disease). She passed away seven years later while waiting for a transplant and seven of her children have been diagnosed with PKD including myself.

PKD is a disease that causes fluid filled cysts to form in the kidneys. The kidneys become very enlarged because of the many cysts and the surface of the kidneys become bumpy and dark in color. Pressure from the expanding cysts slowly damages the kidney tissue, eventually causing kidney failure. PKD is an inherited disease and progresses very slowly. In the early stages, most people have no symptoms but as the disease progresses some symptoms such as high blood pressure, severe headaches, blood in urine, side and back pain and

fatigue develop. In the last stages, the disease progresses quickly and each month there are changes in your creatinine (a waste product found in the blood and urine). When your kidneys are not functioning well they are unable to filter out creatinine so the amount in your blood rises. (Normal count is in the eighty to one hundred level). When the creatinine level gets high, the symptoms get much worse and it is necessary to receive dialysis treatment. Dialysis cleans the blood of toxins either by a hemodialysis machine or through the abdomen, which is called peritoneal dialysis. The only cure is to receive a kidney transplant.

In 1977, I was given a test for PKD and it was negative. Before becoming pregnant with both our daughters I was retested, again with negative results. I was retested in 1982 and in December of 1984, I found out that the ultra sound report indicating I had PKD had been filed away by mistake. I showed little or no symptoms until two years ago and it was at that time that Lola said if I ever needed a kidney she would give me one of hers. My symptoms progressed rapidly and when my creatinine reached seven hundred and ten I was told to prepare for dialysis. True to her word, on December 14th Lola called the transplant coordinator and began a series of test to see if she was a match. Not only did her blood have to be compatible but she also had to be in excellent health. Following each and every test both Lola and I rejoiced at the good news. We did not tell anyone about the possible transplant until the day we received the wonderful news that we were a perfect match

On February 23, 2004 Lola and I entered the QEII-VG Transplant Wing in Halifax and the following day the transplant was performed with huge success. Lola's recovery period was four to six weeks while mine will continue for a longer period of time and I take medication to ensure there is no rejection of the kidney. I am once again in good health and looking forward to enjoying life thanks to Lola.

There are never enough kidneys donated to provide transplants for people in kidney failure; some patients spend years waiting for a suitable donor. Family members willing and able to donate a kidney are an important source of kidneys for many. I was the fourth member of my family to receive a kidney, and three others will eventually require one.

Lola's story: When Wanda first told me that she would someday require a kidney I never hesitated for a moment to offer her one of mine if we were compatible. Wanda married my brother, Conrad, more than twenty-five years ago. We are sisters-in-law through marriage but friends by choice. I was overwhelmed and grateful for the opportunity to give my kidney for a new life. For a few weeks of discomfort, the rewards are great. Many people are born with only one kidney and are unaware of it so one can live a very productive life with just one. Please think about signing your health card to become a donor and wear a green ribbon as an indicator that you support donor awareness.

Community Involvement Award



On April 27th, Emera held their Annual Meeting in Halifax and Carl Grimes was presented with the Nova Scotia Community Involvement Award. Congratulations to Carl on this well deserved recognition. "When faced with a challenge, don't expect Carl Grimes to back down. Known for his dedication and perseverance, you can see evidence of Carl's love for his community throughout RB. From the signs that were erected to welcome residents and visitors to the community, to the vintage River Bourgeois lighthouse that guides people home from the sea, Carl's handprint is all over the town."

Carl, a Leading Steam Plant Operator at Point Tupper Generating Station, has been with Nova Scotia Power for 32 years. A lifetime resident of River Bourgeois, Carl has always been at the heart of the community. His father, Charlie, was the owner and operator of the Riverview Quick Lunch, a local

restaurant and popular haunt. Serving up good food and lots of conversation, Carl learned from the master, and like his father, is blessed with the "gift of gab". (We think that should be underlined). Carl's attitude brightens the lives of his friends and neighbors and he works to keep the heart of the community beating.

When asked about Carl's contribution to River Bourgeois, community members can quickly produce a long list of projects he took on. As one of the founding members of the River Bourgeois Economic Development Committee (RBCSS), Carl and his peers took on initiatives that would benefit River Bourgeois and bolster pride in the community. The first order of business was the development and erection of wooden signs, placed at the entrances to the community, welcoming residents and visitors to "Picturesque River Bourgeois." The overwhelming support for this project carried over to the next initiative.

In 2002, the RBCSS took on the task of rebuilding the River Bourgeois Lighthouse, destroyed by fire in 1990. Carl's determination to regain ownership of the land became a two-year battle. "Most people would have said, "Drop it", and been done with the project, but Carl was determined to see it through," said Sharon Chilvers, a long-time friend of Carl's. After procuring the land from the government, funding the project became the next hurdle. In three months, Carl raised \$22,000 to rebuild the lighthouse, with matched funds from the Nova Scotia Power Good Neighbour Employee Fund. The new lighthouse was completed 100 years to the day that the original lighthouse had been commissioned

Always eager to help out, Carl's generosity knows no bound. As a member of the Board of Directors of the River Bourgeois Community Services Society, he frequently holds fundraisers to help raise money for community initiatives such as the refurbishment of the community playground, the replacement of a roof on the River Bourgeois Seniors 50+ Club and the addition of a ground hockey/basketball area to the Tennis Court facility.

Carl and his "Driftwood" band are well known throughout the area. They provide weekly entertainment for residents of local seniors' homes, as well as concerts during the RB Annual Festival. The seven-day event sees Carl not only perform, but also act as bartender throughout the event. With all these projects and activities under his belt, it's hard to believe Carl has time for much else.

"Carl has done so much for the community, and this award recognizes that he's done something special," said Joseph MacPhee, a long-time friend of Carl's. "Not only does he show his commitment to RB, but his work with the Good Neighbour Employee Fund says that Nova Scotia Power supports his work with the community."

Carl's dedication to the community continues with the development of a boat-launching site. A rich tradition and connection to the sea, the residents of River Bourgeois will surely appreciate this new expansion on their shores.

"A community's core is strengthened when its citizens express their pride and share a vision for the future. Setting that vision and achieving it are important keys to growth and community spirit. For a man who loves to talk, Carl's actions speak louder than his words. His vision and enthusiasm inspire all who work alongside of him in various community endeavours."

I wish to thank all the people who I work with and nominated me for this award. I especially want to thank my neighbors and friends in River Bourgeois who supported it. There are many who encouraged the idea, helped with the fundraising and the building of the lighthouse who are equally worthy. Carl
