Adieu



On November 29th, Canada said goodbye to its oldest citizen, our beloved Sister Annie Adele Samson. Annie was born in River Bourgeois on February 27th, 1891. She was one of ten children of Thomas & Philomene (Bourque) Samson of Church Point. In 1891, John A. MacDonald was still our first Prime Minister; Queen Victoria was ruling Britain and cars were just being invented. She was 21 years old when the *Titanic* sank and 26 when the explosion leveled Halifax. She experienced several wars and the 1929 Great Depression. At age nine, Annie witnessed the turn of the 20th century and at age 109 the turn of the 21st century.

She attended the East End School followed by high school in Arichat where she obtained grade ten, which was then the highest grade available. Annie worked as a mail courier and as a servant at the LeVesconte household before entering Normal School in Truro in 1912. Following graduation, Annie taught in several schools in Cape Breton including a brief time in RB.

In 1917, Annie followed her heart and entered Les Filles de Jesus Convent in Trois Riviere, Quebec. When she took her final vows (poverty, chastity and obedience) she became Sister Cècile. The name change was required in order to detach them from the

rest of the world. Sister Cècile was then to teach wherever the Sister Provincial deemed she was most needed. For the next thirty years, she taught school in Arichat and Cheticamp. In 1947, due to some health problems, Sister Cècile retired from teaching and worked in various offices in Trois Riviere, Nash Creek, Dalhousie and Moncton. In 1967, she moved to the Provincial House in Moncton to take a retreat. That was also the year that the Sisters of Les Filles de Jesus order reverted to their baptismal name, thus she become known as Sister Annie Sampson.

Sister Annie was very talented and composed poetry and songs for different occasions, some even after her 100th birthday. Her distant cousin Garvie Samson published many of the poems in three publications of "*Poems and Lyrics by a centenarian*" and he plans to publish the 4th edition and final chapter of her life in the coming year.

In 1986, at age 95, Sister Annie fell, broke her hip and was bedridden for an extended period of time. During that time she claimed she traveled the globe by praying for all the world leaders. She spent most of her last years sitting in a chair or in bed as she was unable to walk but remained in good health. On her 100th birthday she proclaimed that God must have forgotten her and so he did for another thirteen years. According to Sister Helen Burke she always ate three meals a day, which probably contributed to her longevity. She was pampered by all of her fellow Sisters and simply went to sleep forever on November 29th. We leave you with one of her poems:

Thought for the Day

We can never be too careful What the seed our hand will sow. Love from love is sure to ripen Hate from hate is sure to grow

Seeds of good or ill we scatter Heedlessly along the way, But a glad or grievous fruitage Waits us at the harvest day. We wish to extend our condolence to her nieces Joan Viscount & Helen Konning and her many relatives. *Sharon Chilvers*

The following was sent to us from Garvie Samson:

"I had the pleasure of attending the funeral of Sister Annie at the Provincial House Chapel, in Moncton. To assure the English speaking visitors were comfortable, the sisters provided an information sheet "Words of Introduction before the Funeral Mass" where they expressed their sincere condolences to the relatives and made references to the Scriptures as they related to Sr. Annie and emphasized how she used her gifts of poetry and singing in her service to God. It referred specifically to last Sunday's Scripture: "You don't know the Day that the Lord will come:" which must have been prayed by Sister Annie on many occasions.

Since the passing away of Sr. Xavier (Lola Burke) of River Tillard, last year the only remaining member of Les Filles de Jesus from River Bourgeois is Sister Helen Burke. Our special thanks to Sister Superior Rose-Helene Chaisson and her fellow sisters for making us feel so welcomed and important."

Last year the RBCSS established a "Volunteer of the Year" award to be given annually to someone in recognition of their contribution to the community. We asked the people of River Bourgeois to send in their nominations and we received many. There were many people who did outstanding work, however two individuals shared the top votes: Joe MacPhee & Anne Sampson. RBCSS President Sharon Chilvers presented them with a gift and their names have been inscribed on our volunteer's plaque. The following was read about their contributions:

Joe MacPhee:

We all know Joe as our councilor but very few get to see and appreciate the number of hours he puts in as property services manager, secretary and bingo chair for the RB Community Services Society.

We have many dedicated volunteers in RB but in order for things to get done it is necessary to have someone in the background to be sure everything works. Joe, as property services manager takes responsibility for the infrastructure that allows everything else to work.

As supervisor of our summer student and of our new janitor, he has spent numerous hours mowing the various fields of the recreation complex, spent time helping out with the painting of the upstairs hall, organized a group to refinish the hall floor, aided with the repair of the cenotaph, limed the grounds at the funeral home, etc. No job is too big or too small for Joe.

He continues to be very involved with the festival committee and has been responsible for organizing the Men's Breakfast over the last years. He is chairman of the bingo committee and is dedicated to being there each Friday night.

His job involves being on call for all subcommittee members whether it is for problems with the security system, plowing or plumbing at the Recreation Complex. Everyone (from students to board members) feel comfortable calling him as he never gives the impression we are disturbing him and to our knowledge he has never ignored a request for help.

Anne Sampson:

In every community there is a special person who quietly goes about doing many good deeds year after year. If this award had been available for the last twenty years Anne Sampson would have qualified each time.

Anne has not only been President of the Seniors 50+ Club for the last six years but has been the organizer of every event and the main fundraiser in keeping the club going. Every Sunday she takes care of the forty-five-card game at the club and returns every Monday night to take care of the cribbage games. At both of these events she insures there is ongoing coffee/tea and a lunch provided for the patrons. Anne also represents our club at the Richmond County Senior's Council.

During the past year Anne has organized and operated eight merchandise bingo's to raise funds for several organizations and with the exception of two she purchased the prizes on their behalf. Anne is a master at finding bargains for these fundraisers and has saved the community several hundreds of dollars. Every Friday evening throughout the year Anne is either working at the bingo or selling tickets on behalf of other groups.

She is a member of the Board of Directors of RBCSS, very active year after year with the Festival

and a member of the Economic Development Committee. Anne is also on the Air Cadet Parental Committee and is involved with their fundraising. She has also served with the 4H for almost twenty years as a leader, mentor and president.

Anne we are glad that the word "No" is not in your vocabulary and your grandson Adam summed you up perfectly when he said: "You're the bestest!"

We congratulate both Joe and Anne on their award and thank them for their great work.
