Anne & Joe Sampson



Joseph Francis was born on November 10th, 1928 the sixth of twelve children to James Henry & Mary (Landry) Sampson of the Church Point. The children only had to run down the hill to attend the East End School however a scholar Joe was not. He hid his books in an opening under the school each afternoon and retrieved them the next morning so his dad would think he didn't have homework. Joe was expelled from school in 1943 and went to work as a labourer on roads earning twenty-five cents an hour.

In 1946, Joe went to work in Goose Bay, Labrador and following a two-day training course on heavy equipment he operated a bulldozer for the next three years. In 1949 he moved to Halifax where he worked on the completion of Pier A1 and then relocated to Truro to work for Latimer Construction for the next five years. On Easter Sunday 1958 Joe went to St. Elizabeth Hospital in North Sydney to visit his sister Mary Ellen who had just given birth to her first child and it was there that he met the lovely Anne Pentecost whose brother just happened to be married to Mary Ellen.

Anne Marie Pentecost was born in Sydney Mines, the third of five children. After she finished school, Anne went to work at the Point Edward Hospital for

a few years before going to work at St. Elizabeth Hospital. It was here that she first met Joe, however, it was "not" love at first sight but Joe's charm soon won her over and on October 6th, 1959 they were They moved to RB and lived with Joe's parents. Joe & Anne had eight children Francis, Michael & John in RB; Patricia in Whitehorse; Ben in Borden, ON; Theresa in Lower Sackville; Joanne in D'Escousse and Henry in Havre Boucher. Their third child, also named Patricia, passed away in 1968 at age six. They now have eighteen grandchildren and two great grand children. The Sampson household has never lacked for children; after school the neighbouring children usually gathered for a game of ball, wrestling or just having fun. Sean Roberts perhaps summed the family up best when his mom asked why the kids always went there. He replied "At Anne & Joe's we can be a kid after school as there are no rules for noise and fun".

In 1961 Joe worked for Munroe and Allen which was based in Port Hawkesbury. There he had hands on training as a mechanic and was sent to Gaspe, Ouebec to work. When he discovered the machines were being repaired outside in sub zero temperatures, he quickly high tailed it back to Cape Breton. Following a stint working on the new vocational school in Port Hawkesbury, Joe went to work for Colin MacDonald Construction in Antigonish where he remained for the next thirty years. He retired in 1999 at the age of seventy-one and now spends his days cutting firewood, taking care of his greenhouse and for the last couple of months has been Father MacDow's navigator around RB. Joe is a member of the Parish Council and a member and property manager of the Seniors Club. They both love to play cards and darts with their children, brothers and sisters.

Anne, a stay at home mom, has made a tremendous impact on our community. A 4H founder in RB, she served for twenty years as Leader and President; a member of the CWL (18 years); and she has also been on the Board of Directors for RBCSS

for 7 years. She was a founding member of the Seniors 50+ Club (13 years) and is currently serving her seventh year as President. She also serves as Treasurer of the Richmond County Seniors Club and has been a member of the RB Economic Development for the past 5 years; Bingo Committee for 22 years and Festival Committee for 24 years. Anne is Community Helper for the Richmond County Seniors Liturgy Program and has co-chaired the Seniors Expo for the past two years. She organizes the 45-card game each Sunday and cribbage each Monday. They are many other fundraisers that Anne initiates each year for needy families, the church, etc.

Joe and Anne have passed this great virtue of charity on to their children and the people of River Bourgeois owe you both a huge debt of gratitude for all your contributions. We wish you both many more years of good health and happiness. *Sharon Chilvers*

The River Bourgeois Parish Hall



For those who do not remember, the Parish Hall was situated handy the old ball field on Highway 4.

During the first half of the 20th century there was no parish hall in River Bourgeois, as the pastor, Father Robitaille and his predecessor, Father Chouinard believed that dancing was "the devil's instrument" and that having a hall would encourage people to organize dances. Any parish activities during this time were held in the schools.

On January 18th, 1950, the first appointment made by the late bishop, Most Reverend John R. MacDonald, was Father Flavian Samson as parish priest of River Bourgeois, taking the place of Fr. Robitaille who had died during the previous year.

Shortly after his arrival, Fr. Samson purchased for the parish a new building, which had been constructed as a workshop and garage by Whitney McPhee. The building was just a shell so it was enlarged - a stage was constructed and by 1951 this new building became the social focal point of the river and was used for all activities such as parish meetings, potluck suppers, bingo and card games, movies and other social events. At this time there was no kitchen or furnace in the hall. It was heated by two stoves, one of which was a kitchen stove from which suppers were served with the dishes and outlay being provided by parishioners.

During late 1951 an additional section was added to the rear of the hall, which then served as a kitchen and shortly after this a furnace was installed. There was still no water in the hall so the water required for different activities was carried from the home of Whitney McPhee. The parish CWL funded the purchase of dishes, cutlery, chairs and other required items but there was still no running water or washroom facilities available.

Father Samson died in August 1965 and shortly after Father Marinelli was appointed as parish priest. After Fr. Marinelli arrived, it was decided to purchase an electric stove, have cupboards built and a well drilled. The well, which was 23 feet deep was located approximately six feet from the kitchen of the hall and supplied high quality water

In 1967, a decision was made to panel the main part of the hall along with installation of washrooms to public health specifications. Additions were made as money became available including paneling of the kitchen area, construction of new tables, installation of a refrigerator and stainless steel sinks. When the work was completed, the parish had one of the best equipped halls in Richmond County with an excellent central location.
