Alcantra and Dorothy Landry



Alcantra Ephrem was born Oct. 19th, 1932 the twelfth of thirteen children to Jeffrey and Bertha (Bouchard) Landry of Cannes. Alcantra bicycled to the East End School until there was too much snow and then walked, which included a two mile return trip for lunch. At age fifteen he quit school to help his dad build a boat for lobster fishing. Lobsters sold for twenty five cents a pound and with one hundred and ten traps, he had made \$210 the first year while dad, who owned the traps made just over \$1000. Gas was expensive then as a forty-five gallon drum cost \$10.60 and they used two of those per fishing season. Alcantra fished for seven years and eventually had one hundred and seventy-five traps which he hauled up by hand daily.

At age seventeen Alcantra began dating the beautiful sixteen year-old Dorothy Sampson. She was the daughter of Mickey and Bertha (Lawrence) of Church Point. Following the death of her mom when she was four years old Dorothy lived with her grandmother Emma Sampson on Lavallee Lane. Alcantra went to Montreal three years later to work and Dorothy, who was now smitten with the young man followed and they were wed on Dec 3rd, 1952. They returned home to live at the Sampson homestead while building a house on the North Side which was replaced with a larger home on Church Point in 1972. They had six children: Peter who lives in Halifax, Buzzie (Alcantra Jr.) in Louisdale and Emma, Michael, Donna and Gerarda who all live in

RB. Three children were born on the 10th of November and one on the 12th (Michael was late). They also had eight grandchildren and six great grandchildren. Sadly Dorothy passed away in 2001.

In December 1953 when the now famous airplane landed in Grand Gully, Alcantra and some friends held the repaired airplane down so that the pilot could rev the engine long enough to be able to take off without hitting the power lines. It was the most exiting thing to ever happen in Grand Gully.

Also in 1953, Alcantra along with his dad and Uncle Peter Landry and Peter's son Leo from the South Side were hired to get necessary supplies to L'ile Quetique to build a new lighthouse. They tied two boats together and built a platform across the two boats with a plank to reach from the shore to the platform. Gravel needed for the foundation was sandbagged by Cyril Landry and Stanley McPhee and loaded on the platform. They then blindfolded a horse, which was needed to haul supplies uphill once they arrived on the island, and led him onto the platform. A third boat was used to haul the platform. All of this had to be done at high tide so they could get close to the shoreline at both ends. The horse remained on the island until the job was completed. Alcantra, Jeffrey, Peter and Leo built the lighthouse and they were paid a total of sixty dollars to dismantle the old lighthouse. Alcantra also helped Gerald LeBlanc in the building of our lighthouse in 2003.

Alcantra had many jobs during his career. In 1954 he worked with Davy Touesnard hauling the seventyfive truck loads of gravel needed for the foundation of the Stella Maris School. A pick had to be used to break up the frozen gravel in the pit. Following his fishing days he worked for Latimer Construction for the next ten summers all around the province. He worked eighty one back breaking hours each week; fifteen hours Monday to Friday and six on Saturday under some hot conditions with not so comfortable equipment. As a result of construction work being predominately summer work the off season was spent elsewhere. He worked hauling wood to the pulp yards for Alfred Touesnard, Danny Shaw of Loch Lomond, Ken Shaw of Sydney and John McLennan of Kempt Rd. He was area foremen for the Dept. of Highways from 1978 to 1981 before going to work for the next sixteen summers with Warren Maritimes, a paving company. Many winters were spent working for Bernard Burke. In 1996 he was employed by Tommy Sampson of Louisdale and ended his career there in 2000. Alcantra also fitted in a twenty month period starting in 1961 working on the icebreaker *Sir John A. MacDonald* testing the ice for new routes in Hudson Bay, Frobisher Bay and Greenland

Alcantra is now taking it easy, spending time doing some woodworking and enjoying his family. In 2002 he purchased a trailer and now lives next door to daughter Gerarda and her husband Eddie.
