Norman & Genevieve Warner



Genevieve Agnes was born October 6th, 1947 the third of six children to Roderick & Viola (Sampson) Touesnard of Grand Gully. Her parents were dairy farmers and Genevieve learned everything about farming & gardening, including mastering cow milking by the age of nine. She spent a year at the Lower End School before attending Stella Maris. Upon completion of her schooling, Genevieve did some babysitting locally and remained at home. In 1968 George McNamara, her sister Yvonne's boyfriend, invited his cousin, Norman Warner, to visit the Touesnard family, Genevieve fell in love.

Norman Joseph was born June 2nd, 1943 to Norman & Georgina (Kelly) Warner in Halifax. Dad was serving in the war at that time and the following year the family returned to their roots in Port Hawkesbury. When Norman was nine years of age his parents adopted a one-year-old girl. The following year Dr. Guzdziol of Port Hawkesbury called the Warner family to see if they wanted to adopt a newborn baby. They said yes and the baby was turned over to them. When Norman was twenty-two the same doctor called and said he had twin boys just born in his office and asked if they would be interested in adopting them. The Warner's once again became parents.

Norman's parents were musically talented. Both step-danced and his father played the fiddle for dances in the area. Following his schooling at St. Therese School in Port Hawkesbury, Norman moved to Stellarton to take a course in welding. He worked two years at Maritime Steel in New Glasgow before returning home and taking a job at Stora. In 1968 he visited RB in search of a lady friend and met the love of his life, Genevieve Touesnard.

Genevieve & Norman were wed on April 19th, 1969. Following their marriage they purchased the home of Lillian Morrow in Grand Gully. They have four children. Melody, along with husband Derrick Cameron, resides in West Mabou. They are both talented musicians who play regularly for dances in the area. As for the other Warner children, Christopher lives at home; Kelly, along with husband Donovan McLellan and their five children Mikayle, Sachelle, Keigan, Stephen & Lewis live in Brook Village; and Molly, the youngest of the Warner children, arrived eighteen years after Kelly. A pleasant surprise she was. The children followed in dad's footsteps and all became talented step-dancers.

Norman continued working for Stora for the next thirty-two years retiring in 2002 at age fifty-nine. Genevieve was a stay at home mom who took care of the farm animals and doing what she enjoyed the most - planting her garden. She is also famous for her skills in baking (especially her delicious rolls). In 2000 they purchased a mini home and bulldozed the old homestead and buried it in the front lawn. These days Norman spends his time chauffeuring daughter Molly to and from work while Genevieve still loves her garden and canning. They love their music and along with mom Viola, motor to Mabou each weekend to listen to Melody & Derrick play. Both are members of the RB seniors club and Genevieve enjoys playing forty-five's with mom every Sunday night. Philomene & Dominique Burke



Dominique was born in 1867, the son of Desire Burke & Philomene (Sampson) of the Southside. In 1899, he married Philomene, daughter of Peter Burke & Marine (Landry), of the Southside. Life was quite different back then. The bans announcing their impending marriage had been announced at Mass and with only a week or so until the wedding, Philomene was returning home from a visit with her friend Mary along the Richard Pond Road when she spotted her future husband, Dominique, walking along the road from the direction of Fred LeBlanc's. Afraid that people would talk if they were seen together alone, Philomene hid until Dominique had passed and it was safe to go home. After the wedding, Dominique and Philomene lived with his parents while they built their house. Philomene was known to have played a big part in helping in the construction and was seen perched on the roof shingling and doing many other projects to help make their house a home. Dominique along with his father and two brothers, Michel and Amos owned a fishing boat. During the summer months, Dominique would go fishing pogie in the states and during the slow fishing season he would do carpentry work.

Between 1901 and 1921, Philomene & Dominique had 12 children. Along with raising her children, Philomene kept chickens, cows, sheep, and pigs. She planted and grew most of the vegetables needed to feed the family. Philomene was a great knitter and made all their mitts, socks and scarfs. She made her own blankets on a loom and hooked rugs. In later years, her blankets and rugs were displayed in Mabou for tourists to see.

In 1931, Dominique passed away leaving Philomene to raise the five children still at home. The older children helped by sending money home when they could and in 1932 she got the contract for the Southside Post Office. In 1933 she took a trip by train to the States and took her three granddaughters, Doris, Shirley and Marie back home to spent seventeen months with her. They learned French and she learned English. She passed away in February 1972 at age 91. Philomene & Domique's children were:

Minnie (RB), 1901-1998 - married Henry Laneville of the USA.

Elizabeth (New Jersey), 1902-1994 - married Murdock Martell of L'Ardoise and had three children: Marie and Shirley, now deceased, and Doris of New Jersey; 17 grandchildren, 20 great-grand children and one great-great grandson.

Michael RB & USA (Mickey), 1905-1988.

Emily Anne (RB), 1907-2003 - married Henry Fougere of the Southside. They had three children: Arthur, RB; Isabelle, Halifax; and Lester, Sampsonville; six grandchildren.

Lena (US) - married Lawrence Gagnon of the US. They had two children, Rita & Larry, both deceased.

John (RB) - 1911-1971.

Caroline (RB) - 1913-1913.

Victor (Richmond Villa), b.1915 - married Evelyn Fougere. They have two daughters: Linda in Halifax and Debbie in Manitoba; seven grandchildren and 2 great grand children.

Lawrence (RB), b.1916 - married Hilda Pottie of False Bay. They had one son, Larry (RB) and three grandchildren.

Carrie (Hfx) - 1918-1939.

Rachael (RB), 1920-1972 - married Vincent Sampson of the Church Point. They had six children: Delores, RB; Percy, deceased in 1971; Ronnie, deceased in 1973; Bruce, London; Beverly, Red Deer; Augustine deceased in infancy 1964, two grandchildren and two great grandchildren.
