We Bid Adieu to the River Round Up

Twelve years and three months later, the final issue of the third time resurrected River Round Up is now completed. As we look back at what began in September 2000, it is mind boggling the number of news events we have covered. We have reported on 248 births; 93 weddings & 386 deaths all of which were residents, former residents or relatives of current residents of RB. We have acknowledged 79 High School Graduates (the first three years they were not included in the paper) and 99 university/college graduates. There have been stories about 21 former and current businesses in River Bourgeois; 81 history related stories & 85 stories on local area soldiers who served their country from 1939 to the present. There were also several stories on local soldiers who died tragically in prior wars. We have profiled stories on 251 local individuals including one on Sr. Anne Sampson from RB who passed away in 2004 at age 113 and at that time was the oldest living person in Canada; many milestone birthdays as well as anniversaries and achievements of local groups & individuals. We have published on our community annual meetings, yearly festivals & Christmas celebrations, Canada Days, the restoration of our cenotaph, rebuilding of our lighthouse, our new marina, community signs and the achievements of Mike McPhee.

I personally would like to thank Sharon Digout (the originator along with Joe MacPhee and then summer student Michele Sampson) who has been a great mentor and friend and who has edited my "few" mistakes over the years. I could not have asked for a better partner. To the following team members since day one: Therese Pottie who was in charge of all our mail outs, Sherry Baccardax for her computer knowledge and for keeping us in line, Lynn Boudreau for our website & George Digout for local deliveries. Thanks also to Bucky's garage, Carmen Fougere& East Coast Credit Union who have sold our copies over the years and to those who have joined the team

in recent years including: Art & Karin Digout, April Sampson, Anne Louise Touesnard, Donnie Pottie & all our summer students. Thank you also to local historians: Garvey Sampson, Russell Fougere & Paul Touesnard; the volunteers of the C@P Site and the federal & provincial governments who supplied grants to our C@P site. Fred LeBlanc-My Dad



Alfred (Fred) Abram was born November 28th, 1911 to Mary (Dugas) & Fidele LeBlanc of the South Side. Fred had an older sister Martha who passed away at age 24 and two younger sisters Louise (Smith) and Zabeth (Burke). When Fred was five his mom passed away during childbirth and two years later his dad passed away of TB. The girls moved with their grandmother and later with their Aunt Francine while Fred went to his Aunt Suzanne in the home he lived the remainder of his life. He was expelled from school along with his best friend Henry Fougere at age ten and there were several versions of why this happened. At age twelve his neighbours, Joe & Alvina Landry asked Fred to be godfather to their new born daughter. Charlotte: He took one look at the baby, refused their request and replied "No because I am going to marry her someday". At age twenty-eight Fred began dating sixteen year old Charlotte and he was true to his word and married her three years later in 1942.

Three days after their wedding Fred went to war and did his basic training in Goose Bay, Labrador where he was posted for the majority of the war. The last six months were served in Hamilton. He was a cook on the base and since it was difficult to receive goods because of isolation they once had to eat hamburger for three solid weeks. Fred returned home at the end of the war in 1945. Hamburgers were never eaten in the home.

In December 1945, Fred & Charlotte had their first child. They would have seven sons and seven daughters in the next eighteen years. They now have thirty-two grandchildren and thirty-four great grandchildren plus one more due on Christmas day (that could change by the time this goes to print). They lived in a seven hundred square foot house and only the kitchen did not have a bed. Money was not very abundant and with no television the main form of entertainment was cards. All the children played cards and when they played scat or thirty-one, it was played for buttons and as the children got older they played for three pennies. Baseball was the main sport and both Charlotte and Fred played. The girls always had the advantage as Fred couldn't hit the broad side of the barn door. As a youngster he would wash and dress the deceased to prepare them for the wake. Fred loved to tell stories & tall tales and as a result most of the children refuse to go to wakes to this day.

Fred worked in the lobster plant near his home for \$5 a month. He also ran a ferry service from the South Side to the Church Point for the folks who would walk from False Bay to be able to go to church. Cost was ten cents per boat load. He was a fisherman most of his life and since that work was seasonal; he also worked with the Department of Highways in the summer months. He was the lighthouse keeper for the last seventeen years before it went electronic. He was also the community butcher for most of his life and was often called to assist with sick animals and animals having difficult births. Once he was at Philomen Burke's farm helping a cow that had a breech birth. After several hours the calf was born and Fred went in the house to have a cup of tea. Philomen was listening to the radio when an announcement was made that Queen Elizabeth was in the hospital for several hours giving birth. Fred not missing a beat said, "Guess they will be calling me soon." He also repaired watches and sometimes destroyed them. Not having a horse or tractor he would cut all of the hay by hand with a scythe. As a youngster he sometimes rowed his boat to D'Escousse to cut hay all day with his scythe for \$5. He worked hard to support his family.

Fred loved to play cards and with his buddies Victor & Amos Burke would travel to all of the community halls in the county for a game. Fred had many health issues in his lifetime and passed away in 2000. We miss you dad. R.I.P *Sharon*

Community Organizations

River Bourgeois Community Service Society established in 1978 and now is under the direction of President Rose Merrick & the Board of Directors. RBCSS is responsible for the maintenance of the Tara Lynne Community Hall which includes the tennis court, children's playground & the hockey court,

Cenotaph, Lighthouse, Funeral Home, Bona Field and the Tara Lynne Bursary. In the past year the interior of the Tara Lynne Center has been painted and the floors were refinished. The hall deck was upgraded to meet today's standard and the deck at the ball field canteen was replaced. The dugouts at the Bona field were replaced with a new fenced in type and the tennis court received new gates & repairs. The 34th annual festival was held along with several brunches, potluck suppers, concerts, dinner theatre, trivia night and the haunted house as part of our fundraisers.

River Bourgeois Seniors 50+Club established in 1993 and now is under the direction of Anne Sampson & its executive members. The building is leased from RBCSS and the members of the club which are 138 strong are responsible for its upkeep. Meetings, showers, flea markets, anniversary & birthday parties are held on a regular basis. Card games are held weekly along with monthly mini bingos & Celtic music concerts. The complete gym in the basement is open to all members seven days a week. In the past year, all of the windows were replaced and the lighting system was changed to an energy efficient type. Several pieces of exercise equipment were added to the gym. St. Valentine's tea was held along with potluck luncheons & Christmas

St. John the Baptist Catholic Women's League was established in River Bourgeois in 1953 and is now under the direction of President Marlaine Burke & her executive. The Catholic Women's League distributes assistance to the community, provincially, nationally & world-wide to worthy causes. The members visit the sick and elderly in their homes, hospitals and nursing homes. They also serve night time luncheons at the hospital and distribute Christmas baskets to the needy families.

St. John the Baptist Parish Council was established in 1988 by Father J.J. MacDonald. Louis Digout is the present chairperson. The purpose of the Parish Council was to assist the priest in overseeing the parish duties and several sub-committees were formed in order to do so, including Liturgy, Cemetery, Building & Property Maintenance. Church funds are used to maintain the church properties, the priest and the diocese.

Knights of Columbus was established in River Bourgeois/St. Peter's/L'Ardoise/Barra Head areas in 2007 and is led by Grand Knight Danny Madden. This Christian organization works hand in hand with the parish priest providing faith to families and assisting in duties of the church community. This past year some of the charitable works in the communities have been: breakfast program at the school, team jerseys for the girl's basketball team, ten laptops were issued to the school and the planting and harvesting of potatoes in the "Row of Hope" for the food bank.

River Bourgeois Mariner Society was established in 2009 and is under the direction of President Carl Grimes. The docks were purchased in 2008 by RBCSS and turned over to the Mariner Society in 2009. The docks were established to supply the community members and visitors with a place to dock their boats. The docks are also a place for people to fish & swim. Due to high demand the Mariners Society continues to expand. There is now a ramp and launch pad for easy water excess and they are in the process of installing a building for power connections to make the docks even more user - friendly. The Mariners have a very popular poker run each year along with a great fish chowder luncheon.
